### February 19, 2016

---

**Sentencing for String of Summer Thefts:** Defendant, Jordan Briem, was sentenced on February 19, 2016 to nine (9) years following his plea of guilty in 15-CR-0347 and 15-CR-0472. Between the two cases, Briem pleaded guilty to eight (8) counts of Receiving Stolen Property all felonies of the fifth degree, one (1) count of Theft as a felony of the fourth degree, one (1) count of Theft as a felony of the fifth degree, and one (1) count of Forgery, a felony of the fifth degree.

During the summer of 2015, Jordan Briem and his codefendant, entered into several unlocked vehicles, removing any cash, credit cards, or checks that were located inside. The pair would then go to local merchants and purchase items with the cards, or cash the checks they had stolen. On February 19, 2016, Briem was sentenced to nine (9) years for his role in these crimes.

### February 29, 2016

**Prescription Disposal By The Numbers:** In 2011, Cole Smoot a 16-year-old student at Tecumseh High School decided to experiment with a prescription drug that had been distributed by a student at school. Cole took what was later determined to be Methadone, and died shortly thereafter. In response, Cole's mother partnered with the Clark County Prosecutor's Office to institute a Drug Disposal Program in hopes of decreasing the amount of unused prescription drugs on the street. Since the program was implemented, 1,776 lbs. of prescription drugs have been forfeited between the four disposal sites. Assuming each pill weights roughly a gram, that means as many as 805,580 prescription pills have been taken off the streets to date.

### March 1, 2016

**Plea and Disposition in Reckless Homicide:** On March 1, Preice Staten pleaded guilty to Reckless Homicide, a felony of the third degree. These charges stemmed from his involvement in the death of Travis Feaster Jr. Staten and Feaster were involved in an altercation outside of Staten's home. Witnesses stated that Feaster came to the house to address a situation involving his son and Staten. An argument ensued and quickly escalated. Witnesses report Staten had the weapon involved on his person at the time of the altercation, and that Feaster, Staten and another were struggling to gain control of the gun. The struggle ultimately resulted in the death of Feaster. Through the course of the prosecution, it became clear that Staten did not intend to kill Feaster. However, his decision to bring the gun into the fight ultimately resulted in the death of another, and therefore, he was permitted to plead guilty to Reckless Homicide.

### March 2, 2016

---

**Inmate Sentenced for Bringing Drugs into Jail:** On October 5, Ashley Tackett was in a car that was pulled over by Officers for suspicion of drug activity. Officers determined Tackett had warrants out of Fairborn and was arrested at that time. At the time of her arrest, Tackett denied having any drugs on her, but upon arriving at the Clark County Jail, Officers found a small amount of heroin in her undergarments. Four days later, on October 9, Officers received a tip that Tackett had cocaine in the jail. When asked, Tackett produced 25.80 grams of cocaine from her cell. Tackett pleaded guilty to one (1) count of Illegal Conveyance into a Detention Facility and one (1) count of Possession of Cocaine, both felonies of the third degree, and received a five (5) year sentence as a result.
