

The Board of Clark County Commissioners met in regular session pursuant to adjournment in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 (Sunshine Law) in the Commission Chambers, 3130 East Main Street, Springfield, Ohio.

Commission Rittenhouse called the meeting to order, and introductions were made. **Resolution 2026-0130**

***Proclamation for Buildings and Grounds Department:***

The commissioners presented the Clark County Buildings and Grounds department with a proclamation for their exceptional work during and after the recent major winter storm. The department worked extended hours in severe weather conditions. Their work helped to maintain safety across county facilities. There were no slip and fall incidents reported.

***Ohio Dog Laws Presentation – Beau Thompson:***

Mr. Thompson discussed the updates to Ohio Dog Law coming on March 20, 2026. The updates revolve around Avery's Law, which is named after an 11-year-old who was severely injured by a dog. The incident spurred the legislature to make changes to the laws in Ohio and provide stronger protection for the public. Mr. Thompson discussed how the previous law allowed one free bite. The new law dictates owners now have a responsibility to control dogs before the first bite. There are new, redefined dog categories: nuisance dogs (lowest tier), dangerous dogs (middle tier), and vicious dogs (highest tier).

Mr. Thompson explained the "without provocation" clause remains a required factor for dogs responding to teasing, tormenting, abuse, acting in self-defense, or a puppy playing and accidentally harming someone. The courts may order humane destruction of a dog if the dog commits dangerous/vicious acts or injures another dog. The dog warden designates dogs as nuisance, dangerous, or vicious. The dog owner has 10 days to appeal. There are also new dog registration and insurance requirements for dangerous and vicious dogs.

Commissioner Lohnes asked how the Auditor's office knows if a dog has been declared vicious or dangerous.

Mr. Thompson said he believes the court will direct the owner to inform the auditor's office.

Commissioner Lohnes asked if the courts require the owner of a dog who killed livestock to reimburse the livestock owner.

Mr. Thompson said he is not aware of a provision to allow the courts to provide restitution. He will have to look the answer to that up.

Commissioner Patterson expressed his appreciation for the presentation. He said it is unfortunate this will require more paperwork for the Dog Warden's office.

Mr. Roberts said he appreciates Mr. Thompson for putting the presentation together to make more sense.

In response to Commissioner Lohnes' question about how the auditor's office will know if the dog is registered as vicious, Mr. Roberts said he will have an officer follow up with the auditor's office to make sure the dog has been registered as such.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said it has become a priority of the Dog Warden's office to keep the public safe. She said the county will look at ways to put the new laws on the County's website and social media to get the word out to the public.

Ms. Hutchinson asked if these are automatic offenses or is there negotiations for the offenses.

Mr. Thompson said in terms of designations, those are automatic unless there is an appeal. As far as the penalties for offenses, there will still be negotiations.

***Agenda Review:***

Ms. Hutchinson reviewed the agenda.

Ms. Hutchinson said since the GLP-1 medications have gone down in cost, the cost savings will go directly to the employee and the county.

***Commission Updates:***

Commissioner Patterson said he attended the County Commissioner's Association of Ohio (CCAO) Board meeting on Friday and there was a robust discussion about a bill to have the commissioners look at every taxing authority in the county and look through their budgets to find additional efficiencies. He does not think it should fall on the commissioners. Commissioner Patterson suggested speaking to the state representatives.

Commissioner Lohnes said another bill that would be interesting to look into is the forever levy bill.

Commissioner Patterson said the other bill that was introduced in the last few weeks was the removal of the forever levy. He said he does not know what that means for the past levies, but it stops forever levies in the future.

Commissioner Lohnes discussed the Reentry Committee. He asked staff to add this meeting to the calendar on third Tuesday every month. He said since he left the county and came back, Reentry has blossomed. He said yesterday they approved their Five-Year Strategic Plan. He has asked the director to come and present at an upcoming commission meeting.

Commissioner Rittenhouse attended a Habitat for Humanity home presentation. They had 894 volunteer hours in this project. It was a value of over \$31,000. Several organizations brought housewarming gifts to the family for their home. The owners have to go through courses, help build the house, and put money down on the home.

Commissioner Lohnes said next Thursday at noon there is a public event that shows what Habitat for Humanity does. It is in downtown Springfield.

Commissioner Patterson discussed how the home build is down to a science and the owner default rate is very low.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said she received a call from the Government Affairs department from the Ohio State University Agricultural side regarding their contract with Ag Pro, a provider of large equipment. Ag Pro is reorganizing and Ohio State is losing the opportunity to lease the equipment at a very reasonable rate. Ohio State has been working with Congressman Carey on some potential funding to offset what they are losing from Ag Pro. Ohio State Government Affairs reached out to ask the county to provide a letter of support to receive the funding. She wanted to get the other commissioners' thoughts on providing the letter of support for the funding.

Both Commissioner Patterson and Commissioner Lohnes said they would support sending a letter.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said the next evening meeting is March 4 and there is no planning session that day. She would like to have a public work session to have conversations with the public on whatever topics the public would like to discuss. There would be no time limit per person, and the meeting would be one hour.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said the last few weeks of March will be tricky for her. She said she can attend the meeting on March 15 but will not be available much the rest of the week. The following week on March 25 she will not be available.

Commissioner Lohnes and Commissioner Patterson both said they would be at the March 25 meeting.

Commissioner Patterson will not be able to attend the April 1 meeting.

***County Administration Team Updates:***

Ms. Hutchinson said she and Commissioner Rittenhouse were invited to go to a CCAO meeting with several other counties. CCAO is interested in broadening the aggregation program.

Commissioner Rittenhouse asked Commissioner Lohnes if he could attend the CCAO meeting with Ms. Hutchinson since she has a conflict that day.

Ms. Smith said the deadline to take the survey for the public safety building is March 6.

Mr. Thompson said the court scheduled a hearing today from 10:15 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. He said they may need to take a recess during the executive session today.

Mr. Harris discussed that the county demolished the building for the Habitat for Humanity property. He also said the first resolution for Liberty Place will be on the agenda next week.

***Calendar :***

There were no topics discussed on the calendar.

***Audience Comments:***

Bill Agle, Harmony Township, said he appreciates the commissioners and what they do for the county. He is passionate about the farmland and against the Sloopy Solar Project. He said the only thing green about the project is that it comes from the sun. He asked the commissioners to take a stand and bond with the Harmony Farmland Preservation group, the Harmony Township trustees, and the Clark County Township Association and intervene in the Sloopy Solar Project.

Commissioner Patterson said the commissioners have gone on record and passed a resolution opposing the solar project.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said it is frustrating that the commissioners opposing the project on record is not enough.

Mr. Agle asked the commissioners if Clark County wants to let the Ohio Power Siting Board make the decisions for Clark County or take a stand.

Douglas Rice, Harmony Township, thanked the commissioners for what they do and the letter of opposition to the Sloopy Solar Project. He realizes it will be expensive to fight the solar project. Invenenergy is ready for the fight with the money. Invenenergy is flashing money around to people to get their support. The next step in the process is intervening, and he is asking the commissioners to intervene.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said the frustrating part is the potential of how much it could cost to intervene. It is her personal struggle with taxpayer dollars and how much they should spend.

Kimberly Flax, Harmony Township, said she believes the commissioner's job is to represent the residents. They are now asking the commissioners to intervene.

Terry Adkins, Springfield Township, discussed a man in Dayton, Ohio who beat up another man who then ordered his dog to attack the man.

He also discussed an interview with a reporter about the bomb threats.

Mr. Adkins said a group of people have been begging the city commission to talk to the public for two years. He is glad the county is going to have the public question and answer session.

Diana Daniels, Springfield Township, asked who has oversight authority of the Clark County Combined Health District. She also said the presentation this morning was another opportunity to video and put it out for the community.

Ms. Daniels said the Harmony Township residents are asking the commission to take a step further with the Sloopy Solar Project and intervene in the project.

Commissioner Patterson said Ohio Law was put together for health departments to not be elected officials. The Board of Health is appointed by elected officials. The city commission appoints three individuals, the District Advisory Council vote together as a group on three additional members. These six people vote together for an additional member. It is an independent board under the State Department of Health. The funding source is not controlled by the commissioners, it is their independent board.

Sam George, Bethel Township, said he is in support of the county using resources to intervene in the Sloopy Solar Project. He said Bethel Township does not want the solar project coming to their township.

Commissioner Rittenhouse said it is important for the commissioners to know that.

Mr. George said the commissioners should video record the meetings and add them to the website.

Charlotte Trapp, Harmony Township, said the Sloopy Solar project is adjacent to her property. It will totally disrupt her way of living. It has and will affect her property value. She is asking the commissioners to intervene.

Commissioner Patterson thanked everyone for coming to the meeting and speaking to them. It is important to the commissioners to hear what the people think. It helps guide the commissioners in their decision making.
